Dear Parent/Guardian,

Here at Coláiste Bríde we seek to promote the overall development of our students. This includes the provision of opportunities for them to learn about relationships and sexuality in ways that help them think and act in a moral, caring and responsible way. Sexuality is a key element of healthy social and personal development in all our lives. Sexual development calls for the critical evaluation of a wide range of information, opinions, attitudes and values with which adolescents are bombarded. A holistic understanding of sexuality will contribute to the development of personal well-being, will enhance personal relationships and will have implications for the family and ultimately for society. Relationships and sexuality education (RSE) is delivered to each year group in Coláiste Bríde.

4th, 5th and 6th year groups are taught RSE, which is incorporated into their S.P.H.E., non-exam Religion time and Mental Health classes.

Transition Years will start RSE the week beginning Monday September 21st.

Areas of RSE are also provided across the school's curriculum. Biology, Home Economics, Religion and Physical Education are subjects that deal with varying aspects of RSE.

The teaching methods used for the RSE programme are classroom based with an emphasis on discussion, reflection and classroom debate. All teaching methods used are student-centred and appropriate to the age and stage of development of the student.

Each parent has the right to withdraw their daughter from RSE. However, it will be necessary for parents of any student opting out of RSE to make suitable arrangements with school management for the welfare of their daughters/wards at these times. It is important to be aware that in these circumstances the school cannot be held responsible for information subsequently passed on by participating students.

The normal limits of confidentiality, as outlined by the Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools 2017, will apply to any information coming to the attention of the teacher. However, every effort will be made to ensure that this information is dealt with in a sensitive and discreet manner.
